## Year-end Membership Growth to Exceed 9%!

For the first time since 2017 Del-Mar-Va

Council is projecting yearover-year membership growth! We have seen our biggest growth within Cub Scouts serving 23% more cub scouts than we did last year. We have started 16 new units so far this year with more to go before the end of year, six are Troops for Girls. And we have recruited 1,337 youth this year with 330 being females! A Cub Scout Pack started this summer at New Beginnings Youth and Family Services Center in Cambridge, MD. The program began with 9 Scouts in June and in 5

Cambridge. The center's program objective is to provide a safe, nurturing, and structured



environment for children and families in vulnerable and underresourced communities. Dr. Stafford said, "I met Julie King this summer and knew right away we wanted this program—and I made the right decision!" The Scouting program at



New Beginnings operates as a council-funded Scoutreach unit. Registration and program fees are paid by generous donors like you! Program delivery is managed by Scoutreach Coordinator Julie King with 5 student volunteers from the nearby middle and high school, and 4 adult staff members from New Beginnings. This program is coordinated with wrap around services from the Dorchester County Public Schools including a

dinner meal at the conclusion of the Cub Scout program! This is a hands on active program where children



can move around and receive tactile stimulation. Every meeting begins with the recitation of the Scout Oath and Law and activities are structured around rank advancement in the Cub Scouting program. There is also currently a "den" of 6th graders who will be starting a Troop at New Beginnings in the near future. The Pack (and soon to be Troop) is capably served



by Choptank District Executive Rachael Weaver and is part of the Choptank District.
