

#### Character. Community. Leadership.

Del-Mar-Va Council has served the entire Delmarva peninsula since incorporation in 1925, originating from the Wilmington Council chartered by the National BSA in 1917. Rodney Scout Reservation – named for Delaware Revolutionary War hero Ceasar Rodney – opened in 1923 on the Chesapeake Bay in Cecil County MD. During the peak BSA membership years of the late 1950's Del-Mar-Va Council purchased Nanticoke Scout Reservation - later renamed for Salisbury aviator Richard A. Henson - at the confluence of the Nanticoke and Marshyhope rivers in Dorchester County MD. Due to growing demand for more centrally located Cub Scout camping facilities a third property - Akridge Scout Reservation - was purchased in 2011. This site is named in honor of Eagle Scout John "Chip" Akridge's mother.

Del-Mar-Va Council currently supports over 4,300 youth members and 1,250 registered volunteer leaders in 202 Packs, Troops, Crews, Ships, & Posts. Each of these unit types is chartered to a key community partner including churches, fraternal organizations, and other community institutions. Over 12,000 campers are served annually at our three camps. Scouting programs across the country have helped mold the character of millions of great Americans including Michael Bloomberg, Rex Tillerson, Donald Rumsfeld, Bill Gates, Steven Spielberg, Gerald Ford, Shane Victorino, and Sam Walton.

The Coronavirus pandemic caused what the U.S. Surgeon General has called a men-

tal health pandemic among children. The teen suicide attempt rate has risen to nearly 10% nationally. 67% of fourth graders on the peninsula are not proficient in reading. 39% of Delmarva children live in single parent families. 38% of children and teens are overweight or obese. The Scouting program addresses all these societal needs, and is more relevant and necessary than



ever! The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law. Scouting helps young people build character, develop leadership skills, and positively impact their community. Scouts learn about teamwork, communication, decision-making, and responsibility - all essential skills for success in leadership roles.


#### - Our Vision (continued from page 1)

1. To grow Del-Mar-Va Council membership to pre-COVID levels of 10,000 registered youth members by the end of 2026. This membership will include boys and girls. 1,000 Cub Scouts (ages 6-10) in council paid membership "Scoutreach" units working in traditionally underserved communities. 1,000 Explorers (ages 14-18) in career awareness/workforce development Posts, 5,000 Cub Scouts and 2,500 Scouts BSA youth in traditional Troops, Crews, and Ships.

2. To complete the buildout of the Akridge Scout Reservation to provide world class, year-round camping and program facilities for Cub Scout families. Construction will

include program areas, bath houses, tree houses, yurts, and cabins for lodging, and a kitchen facility to provide food service.

3. To grow the Council endowment fund to provide long-term financial stability and investment revenues to support growing operations and membership.






